Kendall Fells, Organizing Director of Fast Food Forward, the coalition of workers, community, labor and religious groups campaigning to raise wages for fast-food workers. Kendall trained a team of new community organizers that helped two successful strikes of fast food workers in New York City. The movement started in NYC has spread to 130 cities around the country.

Chad Tall is a 21 year old Taco Bell worker supporting his unemployed mother, older sister and older brother on \$8 an hour. He is currently facing eviction and frequently has to choose between eating for the day and paying for his metrocard to get to and from work. Chad was in school for computer programming but had to drop out for financial reasons.
